APPLICATION

Nomination:

Students must be nominated by their home institution online at nomination forms by the end of the application period. If a student plans to extend their stay, they need to be nominated again.

Application:

Besides being nominated, students must also apply online at <u>DAC website</u> during the application period. If a student plans to extend their stay, they need to be nominated and apply again. To apply to our Medical school, please refer to <u>FCM website</u>.

The following academic areas have restrictions and register is not guaranteed for foreign students in all classes, according to the information below:

- Medicine: Only theory courses (up to two courses, one month each, upon Coordinator approval). More Information and Application: https://www.fcm.unicamp.br/fcm/international-office
- Music: Only for Music major applicants, especially instrument classes.
- Dentistry: Only theory courses.
- Art Courses: Only for Art major applicants.
- Sports Courses: Only for Sports major applicants.
- Thesis and final projects: most units do not accept students for thesis and final projects, even if no exam is required.
- Language Courses: Only Portuguese for foreigners or Portuguese for Spanish speakers, and ONLY if the student takes the placement test prior to the beginning of classes.

Areas with restrictions



The language of instruction is Portuguese, with a few exceptions. The Portuguese interviews, for leveling and indicating the most appropriate class for each student, are offered to all foreign students interested.

During the semester, Unicamp offers the following classes: Portuguese for foreigners and Portuguese for Spanish speakers. They are semesterlong and free of charge. However, availability is limited and enrollment is not guaranteed. In addition, only students who arrive in time for the placement interview (offered the week prior to the beginning of classes) are able to enroll. Classes are offered ONLY in Campinas.

Language requirements



For information regarding how many students can be nominated per year, please refer to the Cooperation agreement signed between Unicamp and your institution or contact the person <u>responsible for the agreement at UNICAMP</u>.

Visiting (exchange) students may request classes in all schools, keeping in mind the restrictions described in the next section.

Class schedules (Undergraduate and graduate) are available here. If the appropriate semester's schedule is not yet available, students should pick their classes based on the same semester from the year before.

Classes are offered at four different campuses, in three different cities. We strongly recommend that students take classes in one city. FCA and FT are in Limeira and FOP is in Piracicaba. All undergraduate classes and most graduate classes are offered in Portuguese.

Course offerings



Undergraduate and Graduate students from Partner Universities can register for up to 32 credits per semester.

At Unicamp, each credit equals 15 semester hours of academic activity in classes (lectures, labs, tutorials, etc). So:

- A credit course = 15 hours
- A 4-credit course = 60 hours of academic activity per semester
- A student taking 24 credits will have a total of 360 hours of academic activities in that semester.
- There is no official equivalency between Credits at Unicamp and ECTS.

Course load



According to new brazilian regulation, the minimum workload to be fulfilled by exchange students must be fifteen/15 hours per week.

Thus, we suggest that all students nominated by their universities of origin choose as many subjects as possible from those that interest them during the application period, so that they can be accepted in three or four of them, in order to obtain the minimum workload required by Brazilian law.

The choice of subjects for the Study Plan must be based on the corresponding semester of the year prior to the student's arrival in the country. For example: the student who wants to come to UNICAMP in the 2nd semester of 2023 must consult the courses offered in the 2nd semester of 2022. And the consultation of courses offered can be done at this <u>link</u>.

Course load



Health insurance is mandatory for all international students and a copy of this document must be delivered to DAC via the system. The health insurance plan must cover medical expenses and repatriation from the day the student leaves the country of origin. The choice of a specific travel insurance or another is the visitor's responsibility. If the foreign student arrives in Brazil without health

insurance previously taken out, he/she

will have to take out insurance with a

local agency.

Unicamp has a internal care center called Cecom, which offers medical and dental consultations, in addition to emergency care, and also has two hospitals on the Campinas campus that can be used in urgent and emergency situations, especially on weekends, when Cecom is closed for service. Both of the services only can be used after the enrollment (after the two first weeks).

HEALTH INSURANCE



A Student or Mercosur Visa is required to enroll at Unicamp, and can be obtained from the consular division of the Brazilian Embassy or Consulate in the student's country of origin. A visa must be requested early enough to allow time for bureaucratic procedures, which can be quite lengthy.

Although it is possible to change visa status while in Brazil, this is not recommended, since this procedure is very time consuming. We strongly advise you to enter Brazil with a Student or Mercosur Visa.

We strongly recommend that when applying for a visa at the Brazilian Embassy or Consulate in your country of origin, you also request the issuance of the document called CPF. This is an individual document needed in operations such as opening bank accounts and registering in some public and private services, and it will certainly be asked of you during your stay in Brazil at some point.



LEGALIZING YOUR ENTRY IN BRAZIL

Once you get to Brazil, you will need to register in the Federal Police (PF). For further information about regularization procedures in the country, access Legalizing your entry and stay in Brazil.

After arriving in Brazil, the student will need to register with the Federal Police (PF) within a period of up to 90 (ninety) days. For more information on regularization procedures in the country, visit Legalizing your entry and stay in Brazil. (link)

To help with the foreign student's regularization processes, DERI offers orientation sessions with individual assistance during the <u>Reception Week</u>. Students will receive official notices from DERI on how to participate in Reception Week events.

Housing off Campus

There is no tuition fee for credit-awarding courses.

There is tuition for Extension classes and pre-sessional Portuguese classes.

Students usually spend around US\$ 400 – 600 per month. This amount includes housing and food costs.

Since students often live near to the university, transportation is usually not needed.

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
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
